Understanding Law Enforcement working on college campuses

Community College campuses have sworn peace officers with the power to arrest, and non-sworn security officers with limited authority to detain.¹

The campuses Sheriff Stations are responsible for handling their own dispatching, which means that they are completely self-sufficient stations.

STOP Safety **THINK**! tips

There are easy ways to prevent yourself from becoming more vulnerable than necessary or putting yourself into a potentially harmful situation.



Safety Tips

1. Don't allow technology to make you unaware of your surroundings

- Everyone with headphones, a smartphone, and MP3 player knows – the minute you are plugged in, you barely exist anymore! You stare at your phone, zoned out; not knowing what is going on around you. This, in essence, is exactly what you should be avoiding.
- The key to getting out of a potentially dangerous situation is to recognize it as such. This is nearly impossible if you aren't aware of the situation you're walking into.

2. Never walk alone at night

- Walking around alone and in the dark is basically asking for trouble.
 Sure, there are times that you need to get from point A to B during nighttime hours, but you should always abide by the buddy system. That way if something bad happens, you're not on your own.
- Requesting an escort from the sheriff's office is also an option.

3. Utilize locks

• While it's easy to become relaxed in a college setting, there are some habits that should always remain standard. Locking your vehicle doors, lockers and bicycle locks. Aside from allowing yourself to be vulnerable, it's also much easier for theft to take place if you're essentially providing easier access to burglars.

4. Locate the emergency system areas on campus

- Located on campus are yellow pillars. In the campus parking, there are blue pillars. These pillars are equipped with emergency call buttons for person(s) to utilize in the event of an emergency.
- Mobile cellular phone app. "Nixle" connect is a mass-notification tool connecting public safety agencies to their communities through text. Text 888777 and enter the message "Campuslattc" and you will receive alerts on your cellular phone.

5. Know your way around campus


Take time to become familiar with campus landmarks and streets so that you are able to navigate your way around – or out of an areas, should you need to.

6. Always have emergency contacts on your person and in your device

- If you have a smartphone, program emergency numbers into it. It's one of the first spots hospitals check if you're admitted alone because they are able to bypass your pass code in order to access your contacts.
- Additionally, list your important emergency contact numbers and information in your planner, if you carry one. Whatever items you have on a regular basis are good spots to keep emergency information.

BICYCLE THEFT PREVENTION

- Use a high quality U-lock. Lock the frame & one wheel.
- Always lock your bike to a secure, fixed object.
- Try to lock your bike in a well-lit & well-traveled area.
- If you have any parts or components that can easily be removed (i.e., lights, bags, quick-release seat post, etc.) take them with you.

Step 6: Press "Send."

Using a Standard Mobile Phone:

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Step 1: From the standby screen, press "Menu."

Step 2: Scroll to and select "Messaging."

Step 3: Select "Create Message."

Step 4: Select "New Text Message."

Step 5: Enter the CAMPUSLATTC and press "Send To."

Step 6: Select "New Number."

Step 7: Enter 888777.

Step 8: Press "Send."
