



FEATURED EVENT: STREETVENDOR SUMMIT

The inaugural Street Vendor Summit! was hosted at LATTC on May 22, 2024. The event welcomed current street vendors, those looking to become street vendors, and community organizations involved with the vendor industry. The intention behind the gathering was to open dialogue so the college could learn what street vendors need in terms of support and what community organizations could offer in terms of services and assistance. The ultimate goal is to develop a noncredit certificate in street food vending, which can strengthen entrepreneurship in the community and serve as a bridge from noncredit to credit industryrecognized certification.

What ideas were shared?

Engagement questions were posted around the room where participants could respond to inquiries such as "What are the most significant barriers that you encountered when you started your business or encounter now as you grow your business?" and What do you think those just starting out as street vendors need to know in order be successful?"

Barriers identified included the following: high overhead costs; obtaining and understanding the required permits; dealing with competition among other steet food vendors; lack of funds for start-up to get carts, trucks, etc.; challenges with complying with all the rules and regulations, especially when English is not first language; Here are some of the most frequently reported responses that were shared by the guests.

Things they would like know included the following: need assistance with business classes and other workshops in culinary, food safety certification, customer service, pricing for profit, and management; mentorship from others to help get started; financing and resources including loans and grants to help start busieness and obtain food cart and permits; more clear information about vending in LA County and knowing your rights; more about digital forms and payments; information abour advertising and marekting.

- Public Counsel A pro bono firm that works with communities and clients to create a more just society through legal services, advocacy, and civil rights litigation.
- Kareem Karts A manufacturer that Builds catering trucks and small pushcarts shared information about their company and financing resources.
- LA Department of Public Health Food Inspection Department/Public Health Permits and Licenses provided information on how to obtain food and vending permits.
- LA County Department of Economic Opportunity helps residents connect to new career pathways, start, certify and manage a business; provided information and support around sidewalk vending, compact food operations permits, micro-enterprise home kitchen operations.
